hands-on nursing professional in Western Pennsylvania, serving at prominent institutions such as Allegheny General, Ohio and Sewickley Valley Hospitals. He has served in diverse clinical and administrative roles within both intensive care and medical/surgical departments.

In collaboration with a founding division of pharmaceutical giant AstraZeneca, Mr. Battaglia helped design a medically relevant perquisite for patient care providers that included gold-plated bandage scissors, hemostats and a penlight tucked into an attractive case with a personalized nameplate: The Pocket Nurse. Today he holds several patents for innovative and essential health care education products.

Mr. Battaglia earned his Bachelor of Science in nursing from La Roche College, an M.S. in training and development from Carlow University, and is a fellow in entrepreneurial business with the prestigious Katz Graduate School of Business at the University of Pittsburgh.
