Being a Catholic university is at the very core of our mission at La Roche University. All that we strive to do is informed and guided by the Word of God.

In observance of our 50th anniversary in 2013, La Roche acquired The Saint John's Bible Heritage Edition, a fine art reproduction of the first handwritten and hand-illuminated Bible produced in more than 500 years, since the invention of the printing press, according to the Benedictine Monks of Saint John's Abbey and University in Minnesota, who commissioned the project.

A corps of generous benefactors and friends of the University supported the vision of Sister Candace Introcaso, CDP, Ph.D., the seventh president of La Roche, who believed The Saint John's Bible would serve as a manifestation of the University's mission and Catholic identity. Limited to 299 sets — La Roche has Signed Edition Number 50/299 — the seven volumes of The Heritage Edition are true to the scale, beauty and artistic intent of the original manuscript.

This Bible for the 21st Century is intentionally multicultural and contemporary, with its imagery drawing on various traditions and aesthetics from both the ancient and modern worlds. The powerful message and stunning works of art in The Saint John's Bible are incorporated into curriculum programs, campus

seminars and worship services. Presentations are made to schools, churches and community organizations upon request.

To broaden the appreciation of the Bible across the campus, The Saint John's Bible Illuminations Collection at La Roche University has been established. The generosity of donors enables the University to continually acquire fine art prints and reproductions of the 160 illuminations interwoven through the Bible. They are installed in classrooms, offices and hallways throughout the La Roche campus — many in memory or in honor of special friends of the University — as symbols of our Catholic identity and as reminders of the importance of our Provident God in our lives.

VOLUME I

PENTATEUCH

Pentateuch is the Greek name for the first five books of The Old Testament.

Genesis and Exodus, the first two books of Pentateuch, tell the stories of the Israelites from their creation in Genesis through their arrival in The Promised Land. The final three books (Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy) contain the Law of Moses, the Torah.

The five books of The Pentateuch bring together a variety of foundational accounts and texts that underlie the Jewish, Christian and Islamic faiths. The images in Pentateuch help us explore the nature of God as represented in this book, God's relationship with us, and what it means to be God's people.

CREATION

GENESIS 1:1-2:4a

he seven panels in this image represent the seven days of creation. Gold is used to symbolize God's intervention in the chaos and the subsequent ordering of the universe and its elements. The raven, a messenger in the Bible, seems to be connecting the heavens with the earth.



This illustration depicts a world where beauty and thorns are found together, in the Providence of God. Each year, there are 27 different species of butterflies that visit the campus of Saint John's University in Collegeville, Minnesota, where The Saint John's Bible was commissioned and the original manuscript resides.

ABRAHAM AND SARAH

GENESIS 15:1-7 AND 17:1-22

he menorah, a seven-branched candelabra used in Jewish worship, is the central image of this illumination. It is rooted in two names, Abraham and Sarah, and rises to the inscription of the names of the children of Jacob. This family tree reminds Christians that the covenant between God and Abraham through Sarah is the root of both Judaism and Christianity.

Tacob dreamed of a ladder set up on the earth, the top reaching to heaven, with angels descending and ascending. Butterflies also seem to bridge heaven and earth, and often are hard to keep in our vision as they dip and disappear among flowers and tall grass.



he Death of Moses is the grand finale to Pentateuch. This illumination combines the work of several artists to portray Moses partly facing the viewer but looking upward as if listening to the words of the Lord. The traditional symbols of the two tablets emphasize his identity and importance.



HISTORICAL BOOKS

The story of God told in Historical Books is of a God who is present in history and engaged. In reading this book, we can learn more about the relationship between God and humankind.

The text and illuminations in this volume portray God with the people and dwelling with them in the ark, in the temple, in a mountain cave in the middle of a storm and on the battlefield. The art traces the disintegration of the society and the consequences for failing to keep the Lord's commands.

The illuminations hold relevance even today since, as people and as nations, we continue to struggle to do what is right.




JOSHUA ANTHOLOGY

JOSHUA 1 - 24

his illumination focuses on the crossing of the Children of Israel into the Promised Land. Death, violence and conflagration are present in the flames and the bodies floating down the river. But hope is present in the slender batons of gold, representing God's constant presence and reminding us to serve the Lord.

his illumination, with its rising and descending imagery, depicts the ongoing bad choices of the Israelites and the uncertainty of their future. Gold wedges are used to portray the continued presence of God among his people, even though it is not clear that they will ever do what is right in the eyes of the Lord.

RUTH AND NAOMI

RUTH 1:16-18

In this image Ruth, a Moabite, and her mother-in-law Naomi, an Israelite, are dressed in similar headdresses and flowing clothing, making it impossible to tell who is the outsider. A feeling of mutual love and support is suggested by the inward leaning posture of the two women as they look into the distance, into their future.

RUTH 2:2-23

uth's rising stature, from a widowed gleaner to the wife of Boaz and mother of the future king Obed, is evident as she looks up. Her expansive basket of abundance and promise, and the lines of her dress cascading down, create a graceful design of Stars of David. The vivid, swirling colors underscore the message of the Book of Ruth, that of love and inclusivity.

SAUL ANTHOLOGY

1 SAMUEL 9-31

he background of this illumination is divided by bands of gold, green, and dark purple, which represent the three-tiered hierarchy of God, Prophet and earthly King. These three co-exist with some degree of tension; the gold of God's presence surmounted by heavenly temples, the green of the Prophet interceding between earth and heaven, and the purple signifying temporal kingship.

his abstract depiction of the Holy City of Jerusalem is filled with many arches and alleyways through which the eye is invited to wander upward, toward gilded domes and beyond, to the natural world and sky.

TENT DETAIL FROM DAVID ANTHOLOGY

2 SAMUEL 6:17

his illumination depicts the Ark of the Covenant as it is brought into the midst of the Holy City of Jerusalem and placed inside the tent that David has pitched for it. The tent itself is depicted as merely a veil and certainly not as substantial as the hoped-for temple, and is pulled aside to reveal the brilliance of God's dwelling place.

AFTER THE FIRE

1 KINGS 19:4-18

In this illumination, we see a steep wall of chaos, including fire and earthquake. The figure of Elijah in green, the color of prophets, has his face covered by his mantle to shield himself from the glory of God, in a posture of awe and reverence. To the side stand two angels in white, and the silver bars depict the silence that prevailed when Elijah went forward to meet God.

ELIJAH AND THE FIERY CHARIOT

2 KINGS 2:1-14

In this illumination Elisha is straining upward as Elijah is carried away in the whirlwind. Elijah's arms stretch in two directions: one toward his Heavenly Father and the other earthward as he drops his mantle to his successor.



ELISHA AND THE SIX MIRACLES

2 KINGS 4-6

his illumination is divided into six panels depicting the miracles performed by Elisha. Moving from the left are: abundant loaves, flowing jars of oil, the child raised under the shadow of Elisha's mantle, a microscopic view of mycobacterium leprae, and a floating ax head. Gilded gateway motifs rest along the top of the image offering welcome, direction and passage, through which the love and power of God may flow down.

his illumination, with its rainbow theme, depicts the idealized, dreamlike vision of the kingdom, with palm trees and golden archways. The primary color is purple, suggesting the majesty of the kingdom united by David and consolidated under Solomon.

WISDOM BOOKS

Wisdom Books introduce new visual themes, most significantly the figure of wisdom and the feminine aspects of the divine. In other volumes of the Bible, gold often has represented the presence of God. In this volume, silver (platinum) indicates God's feminine attributes.

Wisdom Books offer practical advice for what it means to live as God's people and encourage people to live righteous lives.

Wisdom is a character in these books, a female who is described in rich metaphor. Wisdom is said to be with God at the beginning of creation and continues as a guide to humans as we make and remake the world in ever-expanding circles of community: families, neighborhoods, cities, countries and the globe.


JOB FRONTISPIECE

JOB 1:2 - 2:5

In this illumination we see a portrayal of Job's world at the beginning of the narrative.

Reading the depiction from left to right, this world of riches and wellbeing descends into chaos as messengers announce to Job each misfortune that has befallen him. The slender bars of gold and silver, meager as they are, represent God's presence.

SEVEN PILLARS OF WISDOM

PROVERBS 8:22 - 9:6

Perhaps no other illumination so fully captures the nature of wisdom as this two-page spread. Seven is a symbolic number in the Old Testament, signifying completeness or perfection. The seven pillars here have moon-like orbs balanced on them, and a series of buildings grow from them. A stamp based on Indian cloth decorated with appliquéd mirrors becomes a fountain, or the crown of a tree, or in the sky a heavenly body emerging from dark chaos. At the bottom is the table, with bread and wine, a connection to the Christological vision of wisdom.

HYMN TO A VIRTUOUS WOMAN

PROVERBS 31:1-31

his illumination is in the form of a sampler or tapestry. Embroidery is traditionally a woman's art, and this illumination draws attention to the place of women in ethical construction. The images themselves have a domestic quality, including water jugs, gardens and quilt patterns. The treatment helps us to see God as a nurturer who looks after the well-being of the home. The tassels on the bottom resemble tassels on the hem of a Jewish prayer shawl that are meant to be a specific reminder to the wearer to pray and remember God's blessings.

ECCLESIASTES FRONTISPIECE

ECCLESIASTES 1

Coclesiastes focuses on life and death and God's place in human life. In this illumination, the raven, often representing death in art and literature, seems to carry the breath of life back to God. It is pierced and surrounded by gold and silver bars, symbols of divinity. The bars of rainbow colors are another sign of God's presence and butterflies are creatures that bridge the human and the divine. Beautiful and mysterious, they remind us of God's skill in creation.



GARDEN of DESIRE

SONG OF SOLOMON 4:12 - 5:8

he Song of Solomon is an elaborate love poem between a courting couple. Selections from this book have long been used in wedding ceremonies. The illumination here frames the lyric text with images of a garden. It is from a walled garden that the two seek each other, propelled by their desire. The Song of Solomon has long been read as an allegory for the love between God and the people of Israel or in the Christian tradition, between Christ and the church.

he focus in this illumination is on words, with attention drawn to columns of poetry without the distraction of elaborately detailed images. Warm colors are used for the rather abstract lilies. The gold of divine presence, which has previously appeared in blocks or bars, appears here as petals or seeds.

De can never see God directly in this life, but in Wisdom we see God's reflection in the mirror. A photograph of a Palestinian woman inspired this image, which was silk-screened onto vellum multiple times. The round frame of the mirror depicts the 28 phases of the moon. In the four corners of the outer frame are paintings based on images from the Hubble telescope, pointing to the cosmic nature of Wisdom.

WISDOM OF SOLOMON 10-11

ppearing in gold in this panel is the word Shekinah, the English equivalent of the Hebrew word describing God's presence or a symbol of God's presence on earth.

This image depicts the column of fire by which God led Israel out of Egypt. Again Wisdom is there. God appears to Moses first in the burning bush and later to the people as fire on Mount Sinai. The people know that God is present in the tabernacle because it glows with the light of God's glory.

It is God who has molded us and assigned us each our particular talents and quirks. The dynamic shape of the text and the subtle shifts of color speak to God's playfulness, making us as he pleases, in all our diversity. The text itself conforms to the shape of a hand cupping rotating clay. Finally, as a potter puts a mark on a finished work, so this text treatment ends with a gold stamp, or mark, as if God had pressed a thumb to the page.



PSALMS

Through the centuries, psalms have been a way for people to approach God and seek deeper understanding of their relationship to the divine.

Psalms is a liturgical book used by both Christianity and Judaism to remind us of our history with God, the covenant and the call to follow God's commands today. The psalms are meant to be read prayerfully, slowly and meditatively.

Religious communities throughout the world often chant, rather than recite, psalms as part of their daily prayer. To honor that tradition, the illuminations in Psalms contain oscilloscopic voiceprints of monks chanting, along with computerized representations of chants from the Jewish, Native American, Taoist, Hindu Bhajan, Greek Orthodox, Muslim and Buddhist Tantric traditions.

People have commented that they look like a cardiogram — a welcome association since music is sometimes used to calm an erratic heartbeat and is intimately tied to the rhythms of the heart which are, of course, the rhythms of life itself.

PSALMS FRONTISPIECE

PSALMS Opening Page

In this illumination, five partially opened scrolls are arranged as a menorah. Individual books of the Psalter are indicated by roman numerals. Running horizontally are a series of thin, golden, graph-like lines — an oscillographic printout of monks' voices chanting daily prayer. The same type of lines, intersecting vertically, are oscillographs of chanting from the Jewish, Native American, Taoist, Hindu Bhajan, Greek Orthodox, Muslim and Buddhist Tantric traditions. These oscillographs symbolize the belief that God is Lord of creation, and all creation reflects God's truth and goodness.

BOOK I / PSALM 1

Salm I lays out the terms and consequences of the covenant: "Happy are those ... (whose) delight is in the law of the Lord," and at the end, "The Lord watches over the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked will perish."

BOOK II / PSALM 42

Jook II ends with a messianic psalm, a part of theology that defines Jesus as the Christ and sees him as descended from the royal line of King David.

BOOK III / PSALM 73

Jook III closes with a messianic psalm that begins positively with a statement of God's promise that David's dynasty will last forever. However, it ends with the cry: "Lord, where is your steadfast love of old, which by your faithfulness you swore to David?"





The gospels and their accounts have inspired artists for centuries. There are great traditions of Byzantine icons, medieval illuminations and Renaissance paintings that reflect the sensibilities of believers in various places and times.




